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

OLD ZEALAND --

We are going overseas for our holidays. Our travel agent has put us in touch with a forgotten country called Old Zealand not too far from here. In some ways it's like New Zealand but most ways it's the opposite which make it's customs seem quaint. You see, they have a learning system whereby young and old alike are able to learn and gain knowledge of the world around them, whereas we have an education system where people are taught and gain information. In Old Zealand they have a health system whereas we have a sickness system. Apparently they were going to have a sickness system but it cost too much and sickness systems require sick people which wasn't what they really wanted.

But what intrigues us most about Old Zealand is the way that their government spends money only on positive, healthy and successful things. In New Zealand the government financially rewards failure and inadequacy. All this is paid for by the healthy and efficient who are punished with a tax burden so great it induces the very indifference and apathy the government has invested in.


The Old Zealand scheme is quite different. They have a simple welfare system based on an abundance of building materials and food which is provided and guaranteed as a birthright to all citizens but beyond state assisted food and shelter a person's welfare becomes their own outlook. They enjoy all manner of facilities and services provided by the business community and businesslike government quangos and the users happily pay from their increased incomes from decreased tax. The Old Zealand government offers financial rewards to steer the citizens towards independence and self reliance. They began rewarding the successful, healthy people from all walks of life with grants of money and leisure time. A man who worked hard and became successful and independent was happily given more money instead of taxed more because the government needed to spend less to maintain him. For every one rewarded 100 decided they weren't as sick or lazy as they thought and thus Old Zealand became the great country it is today. We're sure we are going to enjoy our stay there.










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PICASSO'S



Pablo Picasso was born in Spain in 1881. By the time he was 16 he had established himself as an independent artist. After a period in France, where he painted much and sold very little, he returned for a time to Spain and so began the blue period, so called because his paintings were done almost entirely in various shades of blue. Then followed the rose or pink period and in the 1920's and 1930's he devoted himself to modern forms, Cubism, and sometimes surrealism and symbolism and thereby his reputation became firmly established. He died in 1973, worth in excess of £600 million.

Of the many sailing vessels that arrived in Wanganui some suffered the misfortune of never leaving. The Port Bowen stranded on Castlecliff Beach on July 19, 1939 and despite the many attempts to refloat the 8,267 ton twin screw steamer she eventually had to be saved by dismantling her and using the parts for repairing damaged vessels during the war.



ABOVE: Of the five wrecks pictured the Ururoa was the only NZ built boat and it began its life at Whangaroa in 1900 as a 123ft. three masted schooner rigged scow. Bringing coal from Newcastle she ran aground three miles south of the river mouth. LEFT: In 1925 the Cyrena stranded on a sunken log, outside the moles and eventually broke in two pieces. She had to be destroyed with explosives as she posed a shipping hazard. BELOW: The Barquentine Pelotas, laden with timber, was taken in tow in the usual way but struck the derrick at the end of the mole, lost control of the tow and drifted out over the bar and stranded on the beach becoming a total loss.



The Charles Edward, built in 1864, came to grief at the end of the breakwater while entering the river channel on December 15, 1908. Three days later she became full of water and was declared a total wreck. The 'Charlie' as she was known was 245 tons and 129 feet in length.



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




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
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It is one hangover you won't regret, and has a number of features for you to enjoy, at the risk of drifting away into the Land of Nod, at any moment. The frame is made of 38mm. tough tube steel, that is light, easy to assemble, and stable. The tube steel is immersed in acid baths, which not only cleanse, but gives the steel anti-corrosive properties. The tube steel is electro-statically sprayed with epoxy powder paint, then oven-baked. The result is a product that's coated with one of the best known methods of painting today.

For the 'natural look,' the hammock is made of 18oz. Czechoslovakian flax that improves in appearance and strength when exposed to sunlight. It has a built-in pillow to perhaps bear the burden of a real live 'hangover.' The hammock can simply be unhooked, rolled up, and put away whilst not in use or during adverse weather.


The canopy is made from a light imported nylon material that offers the same advantage as resting in the cool shade of a tree. The canopy can just as easily be unhooked, rolled up, and put aside for those who want to tan. If you just want to keep the sun out of your face, there's a loop attachment on the side of the frame to hold a beach umbrella.

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







