


















## WANGANUI-TARANAKI SOCCER

## A SCHOOL FOR THE WORLD'S PILOTS



















## HAWKES BAY BEAT WANGANUI






## Strippin' Sinclair

We knew that his main ability lay in tennis, he being a foundation member of the Gonville Tennis Club (at present he is the club's patron) and also a member of the first executive of the Wanganui Lawn Tennis Association in 1909: **Our Interview:**

**Photo News:** "How long were you actively at your peak in tennis?"

**Mr Lampe:** "I was continuously a Wanganui representative for about 20 years."

**P.N.:** "What were the highlights of your years in this sport?"

**Mr.L.:** "I played in a qualifying round at Wimbledon and in London. I have seen two Davis Cup championship matches and I have played in the Australian hard-court championships. I have played against Wimbledon winners, Sir Norman Brookes at Christchurch, and Sydney Woods at the Queen's Club, London. In 1929 I teamed with Norman Sturt of Auckland to win the Auckland doubles championships. I later won the same championship with Dr Smythe, Wellington. Around about the same period I and A.L.France, of Wellington, won the Wellington men's doubles championship. In later years Dr R.V.Hooper, Palmerston North, and myself won the national men's veteran doubles title."

**P.N.:** "What were your successes locally?"

**Mr.L.:** "I won the residential championship singles six times through the 1920's and early 30's. I also had successes in men's and mixed doubles championships several times."

**P.N.:** "Were you interested in other sports at all?"

**Mr.L.:** "I took an active part in Royal Life Saving Society activities. I was one of the original members of the Castlecliff Surf Club. I hold the bronze medallion, the award of merit, teachers' and examiners' certificates in Life Saving. I was an early member of the Wanganui Swimming Association executive and managed a representative swimming team to Napier. I have swum in two bridge-to-bridge races and have represented Wanganui at the west Coast championships for the long-distance plunge. I have given demonstrations to schools and colleges in fancy and scientific swimming. Sometimes I gave trick performances such as smoking under water and swimming with my legs and hands tied."

**P.N.:** "With such a record I don't suppose you would have had time for any other activities then?"

**Mr.L.:** "Well, I have climbed the tops of all of the mountains in the North Island, and now I just indulge in bowls and golf as a gentle pastime."






# MOTORING WITH ROBBIE



EXPOSED power-steering pistons, found on some cars and trucks, pick up dirt and grit that ruin the hydraulic seal. You can stop this by covering the pistons with sleeves cut from a plastic bag or bicycle inner tube. Fasten the sleeves on with hose clamps.



Left: A CAR THIEF would not think of starting your car by turning a knob on the dashboard. That's why you can leave this key in the ignition when making brief, frequent stops. Get a matching knob and solder the shank of a spare key to it. Remove for longer stops.

Right: WHEN making a hole in the dash or the fire-wall, avoid the danger of drilling into the wiring equipment by slipping a dowell over the drill bit to limit its penetration. Masking tape will keep the dowell end from chafing the finish.

Left: STOP those broken chains from clanking by carrying along a few of these spring clips. Cut 4" pieces from a screen door spring and bend hooks from coathanger wire. They are faster to use than repair links and they hold the chains under tension.





Right: A HEATER HOSE won't fray where it passes through the fire-wall if you make a grommet like this. Slit a length of windshield wiper hose down the middle and slip the hose over the rough edges of the drilled-out hole in the fire-wall.



## HANDY HINTS

When draining the engine, gear box and differential oils, it is better to do so after the car has been for a run. Then the oil will be hot and will drain out completely.

Spring breakages can be caused by shock absorbers not operating satisfactorily.
