Book Review



Warkworth veterinary surgeon Geoffrey Moon is a man dedicated to the beauty and mystery of New Zealand's wildlife. His first book, "Focus on New Zealand Birds" was published in 1957 and republished in 1960. In 1947 Mr Moon was awarded Associate membership of the Royal Photographic Society for his bird photography. It is easy to see that he deserved this honour when reading his latest book, "Refocus on New Zealand Birds".


The book contains 137 colour and 91 monochrome plates and very comprehensive observations of a very wide range of New Zealand birds. Particularly outstanding are shots of the Kingfisher, the Red-fronted Parakeet, the Morepork and the rare Saddleback and Blackfronted Dotterel.

Mr Moon's book measures 11½ by 9 inches and is published by Reed. It makes a most beautiful possession of great and fascinating interest. At \$6.00 the contents of this book are very good value.


















MOTORING WITH ROBBIE



A MYSTERIOUS engine miss can be traced to the dipstick on some late model Studebakers and other cars. If the stick isn't completely pushed home and the loop of the handle is by mischance turned the wrong way, it can short out the coil primary wire.



READING the oil level with clean oil on the dipstick can often be difficult. Make it easier by prick-punching a series of dents in the dip stick. Oil will collect in the punch marks and show the level clearly. Small drilled holes work even better; each hole then acts as a small lens when filled with oil.




HANDY HINT

Avoid running the road wheels against the kerb when parking. Besides causing cracks in the walls of the tyres the steering can be misaligned.


Left: SPOTS on white convertible tops can be hard to remove. Solvents often leave a dark ring but many spots can be taken out with a soft pencil eraser. Simply rub the spot which should remove the mark without smearing.



Right: IF your car is equipped with an automatic choke you can improve short-trip economy by rerouting a heater hose so that it touches the choke thermostat housing. Heat from the hose keeps the choke from closing during the short pause between errands and saves petrol.



Left: EXPANDING a heavy spring that works under tension sometimes calls for a special tool. Bending the spring and wedging the coils open with flat washers does the trick. When the spring is in place and is stretched once with the normal action of the lever to which it is attached, the washers will fall out.



Right: DISTRIBUTOR lead order can be easily mixed when replacing wires or distributor cap. Some numbered spring clip clothes pegs make it easy to keep track of which wire goes where if you have to remove them all at once. Instead of tagging the pegs they could be marked with pencil or ball point pen.








George Giles

In 1927 a 14-year-old lad, George Giles, started to compete as a track cyclist in Christchurch. He little realised then to what extent his sport would develop. Here is a brief summary of George's cycling career.

In 1932 he won the New Zealand 100-mile championship (from Christchurch to Ashburton and return). In 1934 he won the half and one-mile grass-track nationals on the Basin Reserve. In 1936 he won the triple (time trial, sprint and 10-mile) at the nationals held at Cook's Gardens. This won George selection for the 1936 Olympics at Berlin. In 1937 he shared in New Zealand cycling's only triple dead-heat (with Jack Wade and Cros Murray) in winning the national 1000-metre time trial at Auckland. 1938 saw George win again at the nationals (ChCh) in the time trial, spring and 10-mile events. Once again this effort won him a place in a New Zealand representative team to the Empire Games at Sydney. George scored a bronze medal at these games. He took to professional riding in 1938, winning some championships, and finished in 1941 when he went overseas with the 3rd Division. After the war George took to the bike again—mostly training others. He trained national mile winner (1946) Fred Clinton, West Coast title winner Jim Chalk, national tandem winners Gordon Sharrock and




Graham Wakeley, 1950 endurance rider (from Auckland to Wellington) Snow Mitchell and others. Of course it was only natural that George's sons would ride too. He trained his boys Leon, Michael and Terry, all of whom shared much success. Another son, Wayne, represented Wanganui as a diver. George finished his active association with cycling in 1961, but he's still keenly interested.













They have made well over a hundred so far.






