





## Wanganui Golf Championship



The touring Australian rugby team spent a few days in Wanganui recently. The highlight of their stay, of course, was their clash on Spriggens Park with the Wanganui representatives. Outside of their training sessions and the game not a lot was seen of the Aussies as they seemed to stick pretty close to their hotel for most of their stay. Generally considered by New Zealand rugby "big-wigs" as being the strongest overseas team to hit these shores, the Aussies fielded 13 of their second test team against our local boys. No need to add that the Wallabies walked all over Wanganui. On these pages we picture the tourists at leisure, at training, and in play at Spriggens Park.

## The Game

It took the Wallabies about half an hour to settle down to the bustling tactics of Wanganui's forwards. Then the visitors took the bit in their teeth and tossed the ball around with careless abandon to easily outclass our boys by 29 points (five tries, four conversions, and two drop-kicked penalties) to six (two penalty goals). This was the Wallabies' third highest score of the tour and it could have been a lot higher that it finished up.....the Aussies being robbed of certain tries on a number of occasions by bad handling. The game was somewhat marred by numerous outbreaks of "dirty" play...the majority of which we must place the blame on the visitors for..Certain members of their team were rather adept at delivering crashing late tackles and on one occasion we saw an Australian forward put his boot into a Wanganui player who was some distance from the ball. However, tempers do get frayed and they're all good buddies when the game is over.





















## Trainer Teaches Safety


The Transport Department has recently been operating in the Wanganui district with special trainers, made available by the Shell Oil Company, in giving road safety demonstrations to schools. The Shell Company owns six of these trainers...each set containing cars (valued at £75), bicycles, road signs, kerbing, and pedestrian crossings. Groups of children are schooled in the workings of the trainer and give practical demonstrations with the equipment to other children. "Photo News" was at Carlton School to record these photographs of it being used in a public demonstration.



Toddlers are more likely to remember the essentials of road safety by having them demonstrated by impressive things such as big pedal cars, simple street layouts, and children whom they know as the performers. 



















# Rugby: Wellington Wins







## Jewel Display



**CHAMP HOLES IN ONE.** A hole-in-one is something of a rarity in the game of golf...the chances of it occurring during a championship final are rare...and the chances of having a press photographer on the spot to record the feat are even slimmer. Photo News photographer Rob Graham was the only lensman on the scene to record a hole-in-one by Terry Kenny, 1962 Wanganui open champ, during his final match with John Farley. Terry put the ball between the pin and the lip of the cup after a 154-yard drive from the 5th tee. To the left of Terry's putter can be seen the mark where the ball landed before lodging in the cup.
