





Champs Show How






Sun-dappled Lane











Surf Boat Launched


The Australian-built surf boat, presented to the Castlecliff Surf Life-saving Club by the William McA. Duncan estate was christened and launched at a special ceremony at Castlecliff recently. The £500-plus craft is 25ft long and is manned by a crew of five, four rowers and one man on the sweep oar at the stern. Chairman of the Duncan Trust Board, Mr R. Robson, named the boat Wm. McA. Duncan and then crashed a bottle of champagne across the bows (the bottle broke on the third attempt). The fine new surf boat was then launched and introduced to the Tasman Sea at Castlecliff. It will be used for swimming and shark patrols.














Tennis: England v. New Zealand







Winemaker Retiring


After making wines for 35 years for wholesalers from Auckland to Dunedin, Johnny Jaboor, Burmah Road, Aramoho, is retiring. A Lebanese, Johnny's recipes are ones that have been in his family for centuries. His acre of grapes yielded about 600 gallons of sheries, port, and a little creme de menth per year. All of the wines were brewed in 100-gallon vats and left to mature in 36-gallon oak kegs for some three years before bottling. Johnny's licence expires in June and he does not intend to renew it. He will keep growing enough grapes in his glass-house, however, to keep himself in wine for the rest of his days.








MOTOR-BOAT RACES




SWIMMING RECORDS FALL















Six Tank Corps vehicles and drivers were lent to the regiment to assist during the camp. In return for their services they were given the opportunity to fire one of the guns.
