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




Home Made — and it Flies!

A city businessman recently handed his home-made aircraft to the chief instructor of the Wanganui Aero Club for its first trials in the air. Instructor Noel Faircloth was most enthusiastic over the midget ("you don't fly it, you wear it") French-designed Druine Turbulent. The Turbulent has a wingspan of only 21ft and an overall length of about 20ft. The most famous owner of one of these little aircraft is Prince Phillip, Duke of Edinburgh. Basil de Jong and Jim Beale were the men who put most of the work into the machine for the owner. Cost?...about £1500.



The Turbulent is powered by a modified Volkswagen car engine. Its top speed is about 124m.p.h. and it has a range of about 300 miles and a ceiling of 7,000ft. We wish the owner happy flying.








Wanganui Features at Trade Fair

The Wanganui Industrial Promotion Council's stand at the New Zealand Trade Fair in Wellington has attracted a lot of attention. A futuristic and eye-catching court designed to spur tourist, cultural and industrial interest in Wanganui, the display was erected in the Wellington Winter Show building by a team of City Council and Power Board tradesmen. The court was designed by Messrs Tom Williams and the Rev. E. W. Lewis. 



A machine which manufactures metallic tubing and sheathing from steel tape has been installed at the Balgownie premises of the General Machinery Co.Ltd.The first of its kind in the Southern Hemisphere, the machine will make tubing which will find most of its use in the manufacture of pre-stressed concrete....but it has other uses. The machine will be operated by a new company, United Flexible Metallic Tubing (NZ) Ltd., which has as its parent a London firm of the same name. Directing the new firm in New Zealand will be managing director of the General Machinery Co., Mr E.A.Millward. The group engineer for the parent company, Mr R.Jenkins, and the engineer for the proposed unit in Australia, Mr O.Holle, were present to see the Wanganui machine make its first runs.





Anzac Services



More than 650 ex-servicemen marched to the Cenotaph for the dawn service which was conducted by the R.S.A. padre, Rev. H.W.Austin.













Wanganui Hunters in the Southern Alps





Courtesy Flight



The Skyliner is the remodelled DC3, the great workhorse of the N.Z. airline. The main modifications have added to the comfort of the passengers. Most noticeable features are the larger windows, individual ventilation nozzles, better soundproofing, Friendship type seats, public address system...and you can smoke now.

The introductory flight for the Wangamui passengers was a most enjoyable one to and around Mount Ruapehu. On the return trip (following the course of the Wangamui River) coffee was served.







Reprieve for Cattle



The cattle soon vacated the accident scene and entered gardens of nearby residents. This mob was spotted by the photographer making off through the Gonville shopping area.




Contractors were soon on hand to transfer animals from derailed wagons which remained upright
















