




The final score was 14-12.













"Reluctant Debutante"







Mobilgas Economy Run


Wanganui played a big part in the recently-completed 1963 Mobilgas Economy Run. The River City was the meeting place for the 26 competing cars and crew and the three stages of the run were started from this city. Residents of our city had a more personal interest in the trial in watching the fortunes of the three local cars taking part. Two of the local entries, Mr and Mrs Laurie Edmonds in their Ford Cortina, and John Dunlop and Murdoch Smith in a Jaguar 3.4, performed creditably but did not figure in the major placings. The other local entry, a Morris Oxford, driven by Mrs Betty Blair and Mrs Zeta Low, were just pipped into second place in their section. The 732-mile, three-day run covered a large part of the lower half of the North Island and finished in Masterton.







Awards for Bravery





Clay Bird Shoot





Golfing fans were extremely well catered for with the terrific line-up of talented exponents who contested the New Zealand Open golf championship for 1963 at Wanganui's Belmont course. Heading the list of 120 entries were Australia's Peter Thomson, Kel Nagle and Bruce Devlin and New Zealand's Bob Charles. Australian Frank Phillips went out for the final round of the Open with a three-stroke lead over his nearest opponent, Bruce Devlin, and four strokes up on Thomson and Nagle. However Phillips "blew up" and the race was on between Thomson and Devlin. Devlin just managed to pip Thomson on the 18th green to win the title by one stroke. The amateur with the best score was Wanganui expert, Bryan Silk. Silk's total was 286 for the 72 holes, the same as Bob Charles. A crowd of 5000 watched the finals of the Open, the largest crowd ever at Belmont.
















