







Six Wanganui and three Marton enthusiasts entered their cars in the recent 1965 International Rally for Vintage and Veteran Cars, a competitive tour of the Haast Pass, Southern Lakes and goldfields of New Zealand, organised by the Vintage Car Club of New Zealand. All but six of the 290 starters finished the 1300-mile journey under their own power. Most of the entries were from New Zealand but others came from Great Britain, U.S.A., Holland, South Africa, Malaysia and Australia. 
















BELOW LEFT: Keith Leuschke, Auckland, won the men's trick championship for his third successive year. He is pictured at right making an undignified landing during a clown act.






























Gun Collector

A man whose family has been in this district since 1846, Mr Alf Caines, has in his city home a collection of firearms that would be the envy of collectors all over the world. One room of Mr Caines' house is set aside to house the dozens of guns, swords, war souvenirs and curios which he has collected over the years. We picture here some of his collection.




Still loaded with cap and ball. This Colt 36 was found 30 years ago at Nukumaru and is believed to have belonged to an officer killed in action against the Maoris.












National Cycling Championships














