

THE LIONS RUGBY ALBUM



Unlike newspapers, "Photo News" magazines are kept for many years by most of our buyers. We hear very often from people who like to pick up an old magazine and read all over again the happenings in Wanganui of several years ago. For your pleasure, and especially for those of you who save your magazines, we present here our "Lions' Album"...the most comprehensive photographic coverage published of the recent game between the British Lions Rugby team and the Wanganui-King Country combined side.

COMBINED BEAT THE LIONS: The combined Wanganui-King Country rugby teams twisted the tail of the touring British Lions to the tune of 12-6 at Spriggins Park earlier this month. And what a wonderful game the Combined side played! Captained by "the finest Rugby player in the World", the mighty Colin (Pine Tree) Meads, the Combined team took control of the game right from the very start and, apart from a brief reversal in the second half, never let go. Combined's points came from a "potted goal" by Ingham, a try by Redwood and two penalty goals by Sowter. The Lions scored from a penalty by Wilson and a dropped goal by Weston. The two captains, Mike Campbell-Lamerton and Colin Meads, are pictured here leading their teams out for the start of the game. Seventeen-and-a-half-thousand spectators were present.












Trade Sports








Better Driving Contest







