


CHRISTMAS PROCESSION









PERSONAL OPINIONS

THIS MONTH'S QUESTION: Do you consider that Castlecliff Beach is in a dangerous state at the present?



GEORGE A HELEM...Rescued from drowning three weeks ago: "It is certainly dangerous. I was in waist-deep water about 30 yards out. I stepped backwards into a hole and...whoosh! A current swept me out to sea. These holes should be checked at low tide and pegged off to warn swimmers."




IAN BURGESS...President, Castlecliff Surf Club: "The beach is dangerous at present due to a steep ledge at high tide. At low tide there are holes with dangerous rips. Present conditions are not permanent (they are typical of West Coast beaches) and when the weather settles, they could level out. My advice to swimmers is:

- A. Swim with the crowd. If you must swim alone, then swim where the surf is breaking. This indicates shallow water.
- B. Mark your point of entry and stay in that area. Do not drift down the beach.
- C. If you should drift into a hole, don't swim against the tip. Swim across it and you will eventually come ashore."



DENNIS SPRING, Aged 10...Ikitara Road: "I think the beach is dangerous. I never go in too deep but a couple of times I have stepped into holes and have lost my feet. These holes scare me."

WINNING SMILES











The twin-jet Dassault Falcon aircraft, seating nine people, cruises at 575 miles per hour—faster than the giant DC8 of Air New Zealand.



Fitting Wing Mirrors



1. Select a point about one-third of the way back along the mudguard. Get someone to hold the mirror there while you sit in the driving seat to make sure you can see the mirror without having to crane past a wind screen pillar.




3. Drill a 1/4 inch hole or smaller but don't try to use a drill the full size of the hole needed because it will almost certainly run off the centrepunch mark. Remember that the mudguard is not very thick.




5. File the hole to a perfect roundness and check with the mirror stem at frequent intervals. Don't use a file so large that it will stick in the hole, and hold it at an angle to the surface while you're filing. Don't be in too big a hurry or the file may pull right out and scratch the paint.




7. If the mirrors are of the flyback type, fill the plastic cups with thick grease before the final assembly. This will prevent any seepage of rainwater in service and also help the flyback action.




2. When you have selected the spot, centrepunch it and use a good sharp punch to make a deep impression, otherwise the drill might run out of the centrepunch mark and cut a groove in the paint work.



4. Next put a larger drill through the pilot hole. As the metal is so thin it is most unlikely that a truly round hole will result so for this reason the large drill should be at least a sixteenth of an inch smaller in diameter than the final size.



6. Paint the metal edges of the hole or treat with an anti-rust compound before applying the paint.




8. Make sure you have the washers in the correct order - the rubber washer on top of the mud guard and the plain one underneath. An extra rubber one between the plain type and the mud-guard metal is a good idea. Set the arms at right angles to the centre line of the car and tighten up.




IMPROVING THE BEACH










