


## JAYCEES CLEAN UP ROAD






## KINDERGARTEN FAIR

Around about £200 profit resulted from the Wanganui Free Kindergarten Association's fifth combined fair, held at the Memorial Hall.







Left: The hydroplane Samantha skips along in the eight-mile event for all-in hydros.



**Below:** A Wellington entrant, Mr Magic, was a prominent performer. He is pictured leaping from the water while at high speed.



























## Focus on

# "PHOTO NEWS"

Over the past eight years the "Wanganui Photo News" has become part of the way of life for the greater majority of our residents.

In this time we have published thousands and thousands of photographs, both in colour and in black and white, of the people, events, and scenes of our city and district.

Even though "Photo News" has become the "accepted thing" in Wanganui (as it has in our other publishing districts) perhaps there are many of you who wonder just how it is compiled and how, and where, it is printed.

With these pages we hope to enlighten you on these matters.

"WANGANUI PHOTO NEWS" was the third of a chain of similar magazines to be established by the Logan Publishing Company, the first being in Gisborne (some 13 years ago) and the second was the "New Plymouth Photo News", edited, incidentally, by Reg Eves, a former Wanganui Chronicle photographer. The editor appointed to produce the first "Wanganui Photo News", eight years ago, was Rob Graham. He took on the job after establishing the Wanganui Herald's first photographic department as their first press photographer.

In his position as editor of "Photo News", Rob photographs, writes, manages and distributes his product.

The Logan Publishing Company now prints magazines at Gisborne, New Plymouth, Wanganui, Nelson, Whangarei, Napier, Rotorua, Hamilton and Tauranga.

Rob's copy, pictures and page plans are flown by N.A.C. to our new factory in Gisborne...over 9,000 sq.ft. of modern offices, darkrooms, press rooms, etc., for sub-editing and preparation for the process camera. This converts them, four pages at a time, into 20" x 16" sheets of film. These are then printed down to sensitised aluminium plates, eight pages at a time. The plates are then clamped into large offset presses for the actual printing process. The colour covers are printed on a smaller press.

### A SPECIAL WELCOME:

As New Zealand pioneers of litho offset news presentation, Photo News welcomes both of our Wanganui daily papers (who are installing web offset presses) to this field of printing which we have used so successfully for the past 13 years.



EDITOR ROB GRAHAM...He's Photographed Them Inside And Out: Since leaving Horowhenua College in 1953, Rob has worked as a student radiographer at the Wanganui Hospital's X-Ray department (for two and a half years), worked as a part-time photographer for Tesla Studio (in Mark Lampe's days), spent eight months with Kodak (in Wellington), established Wanganui Herald's photographic department and worked there for over two years, and has been "Wanganui Photo News" editor for the past eight years.





**HOW'S THIS FOR PUBLICITY FOR OUR CITY?:** Wanganui's deputy-Mayor, Mr Martin Smith, M.B.E., J.P., has bought every Photo News since we started eight years ago. After reading his magazine he posts it to relations overseas. The one magazine travels first to Monterey (California), then to Pacific Grove (Calif.), then to Walnut Creek (Calif.), then to San Francisco, then to Seattle (Washington), then to Yakama, then to Winatcche (both in Washington), then to Vancouver (Brit. Columbia), then to Pittsburgh (Pennsylvania), then to Detroit, then to Miami...and finally it goes to the United Kingdom.

Each colour picture is printed four times, with red, blue, yellow, and black inks, which combine together to give a full range of colour tones. The four negatives which determine the density of each ink required to produce the final colour are known as separations.



The colour transparencies pass through seven different chemical baths, each of them critical in temperature and time, before being fully developed and fixed. The baths are contained in a 16-foot fibreglass tub which is immune to corrosion from the chemicals.




In the plate-making machine, an arc light of considerable intensity exposes the plate through the negatives.



A separation is scrutinised before being passed for printing. At this stage, colour and black and white processes join. Both are now in negative form, and will be exposed on to plates for the printing process.



The plates are developed in a fibreglass tub by hand application of chemicals. They are now ready to commence printing.




Above left: Preparing one of the black and white machines for printing.
















## A.T.C. EXERCISE




## Customs Haul






YOU CAN replace the exhaust tail pipe without damaging the muffler if you place a block of wood between the car frame and the muffler, then place a jack directly under the block, below the muffler. Only put sufficient pressure on the jack to hold the muffler in place while you work.


WIRE



IF YOU are ever short of a valve lifter when you're doing a valve job you'll find you can replace the springs without a lifter if you compress each one in a vice and keep it compressed by means of two short pieces of wire, one on each side. When the spring has been installed and the valve keyed, you can remove the wires with the pliers.




A SMALL funnel connected to a length of small diameter rubber or plastic tubing makes an effective stethoscope for tracking down vacuum leaks around the carburettor and intake manifold where the noises made by such leaks are generally drowned out by other engine noises.



TDC MARK


THE TOP dead centre mark on the timing pulley will be much easier to see if you clean the pulley thoroughly and paint it with black paint, then dab some white or aluminium paint on the TDC mark and pointer. The marks will show up well even with a low intensity timing light. When painting the pulley it is better to use a flat black paint rather than enamel.




1/4" INTERVALS

A CALIBRATED gap simplifies testing engine ignition. Drill a hole through a block of clear plastic, thread it for screws, and scribe the interval marks as shown. Connect the spark plug wire to one connection and clip the other lead to the engine block.

A PIECE of asbestos siding or cardboard carton opened out can be used to give your car enough traction to creep out of slight depressions and slick spots in mud or snow. A couple of short pieces carried flat in the boot will be out of the way but ready for instant use in cases of emergency.
